Drink a little Aykroyd

TORONTO (AP) - Dan Aykroyd is throwing his star power behind an \$11 million winery that aims to boost the Niagara wine region's international profile. The Dan Aykroyd Winery, which will showcase souvenirs from the actor's career, will be located near the town of Lincoln, Ontario, in the heart of the province's vineyards. "This is really a dream," said Aykroyd, who was born in Ottawa, during a news conference Wednesday.

"We joked about doing a Coneheads vodka or something," the 54-year-old actor said, referring to one of his best-known characters on NBC's "Saturday Night Live." "And I never thought that a line of wines would be a possibility."

The project is a venture by Toronto-based Diamond Estates Wines and Spirits Ltd. Chief Executive Officer Murray Marshall said he hopes the winery will draw at least 44,000 visitors a year.

He said the winery will produce everything from mid-range wines, costing from \$14 to limited releases for more than \$93 a bottle.

Aykroyd was nominated for a supporting actor Oscar for his role in 1989's "Driving Miss Daisy." His screen credits also include the "Ghosts" movies and "The Blues Brothers" with John Belushi.

Shriver defying doctors

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) - Eunice Kennedy Shriver is defying her doctors' predictions as she recovers from a series of strokes, said her son-in-law, Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger.

Shriver's family was told she would "never speak again" because of damage caused by the strokes, the governor said, but the 85-year-old Shriver has proven her doctors wrong, Schwarzenegger said Sunday. "Of course, she prays every

day and goes to church every day, and her prayers were answered, and she's speaking again fluently and is screaming at me again," Schwarzenegger said at a dinner honoring the Rev. Frederick Murph of Brookins Community AME Church in Los Angeles.

The church also honored Shriver - the sister of President John F. Kennedy and Sen. Edward Kennedy, and the mother of Schwarzenegger's wife, Maria Shriver - for her work in founding the Special Olympics in 1968.

Lohan sued for crash

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Lindsay Lohan's legal problems continue even while she recovers in rehab.

The 20-year-old actress has been sued by Grandeur Inc., which claims Lohan crashed into a company van in October 2005.

Lohan was behind the wheel in Beverly Hills when her car collided with a parked van, according to small claims court papers filed May 18. Grandeur Inc. is seeking \$3,624.84 in damages, the celebrity news site CelebTV.com reported.

Lohan's spokeswoman had no comment Tuesday. A judge will hear the matter on June 20.

Lohan checked into rehab May 28 after a wild Memorial Day weekend during which she crashed her Mercedes-Benz into a curb, was arrested for suspicion of driving under the influence and was photographed slumped in the passenger seat of a friend's car. It is Lohan's second rehab stint this year.

Dylan receives Prince award

MADRID, Spain (AP) - Bob Dylan was awarded Spain's Prince of Asturias arts award, one of the country's most prestigious honors, on Wednesday.

"He's a living legend of popular music," said Jose Llado Fernandez-Urutiua, president of the prize's panel of judges.

Dylan, 66, has been one of the most influential popular music artists in recent decades. His hits include "Blowin' in the Wind," "The Times They Are a-Changin'" and "Like a Rolling Stone" and "All Along the Watchtower."

"He's considered one of the most important figures of song, a form in which he combines, in a majestic way, the beauty of his poetry and ethical commitment," said the prize foundation in a statement.

"For this reason, his music and message have had an outstanding influence on several generations of young people."

Dylan, born Robert Zimmerman in Duluth, Minn., was ranked No. 2 in Rolling Stone magazine's 100 Greatest Artists of All Time in 2004, second to the Beatles.

His most recent recording, "Modern Times," on the Columbia Records label, entered the U.S. album charts at No. 1 one week after it was released in 2006.

Some professionals do the least professional job

I am a clergyman who has seen more than my share of rude, incompetent professional photographers.
